Reliquary figure (byeri), Fang Peoples (Cameroon), wood and brass sheets, 58.4 centimeters

Function:

This figure sits on top of the relic. Without the relic, this figure loses its power.

Function:

Used in initiation rights for young people's coming of age ceremony.

Form:

Similar to the medieval time period, the Fang people focused more on the concept, not the outward appearance.

Context:

Relics weren't buried because the Fang peoples were nomadic. So, they created containers and placed these figures on top of them.



Content:

This figure depicts a talisman that provides protection from evil, brings good luck, and has supernatural properties.

Content:

Usually, remains of relevant community members or ancestors were placed in here with medicine.

Form:

The figure is very geometric, and is made up of simple shapes.

Content:

This figure shows Africa's religious view on life and death.

Content:

The Fang peoples believe that infants and ancestors are closely related. The features of ancestors and infants are usually combined in these figures

Content:

The figure's features are made of brass or copper alloy. Those materials represent high status, because they are associated with long distance trade.
