Mary Cassatt adds an emphasis on the young woman's neck. This may be due to the Japanese sign of beauty.

The color scheme is used by Mary Cassatt to highlight the young woman's skin tone and to put an emphasis on her natural beauty.

Cassatt drew the voyeuristic element of the scene from precedents in works by Rembrandt and Ingres. She studied these at the Louvre when she was a young student

The Word, "la coiffure" evokes a precise image of a wealthy woman in a glamorous setting.

The lines in the couch and straight lines on the walls and the mirror, provide a contrast to the young woman's curved body figure.

The Artist, Mary
Cassatt, was inspired
by Japanese wood block
prints that she had
seen at the Ecole des
Beaux-Art. She was
fascinated by the
everyday themes and
pure beauty depicted
in the wood block
prints.

The Subject of this piece is the woman's body. It, however, is not sexualized like the women depicted in Ingres and Rembrandt's art work.

The curves of the woman's back and neck mimic the curve of the chair. Cassatt also uses pastels which she enjoyed using in a lot of her work.
